Dear District 86 Community,

This weekend, a student from Hinsdale South posted an offensive, hateful and racially motivated comment on social media in response to the tragedy involving George Floyd and the overall treatment of people of color. Although it did not happen on school grounds or during the school year, we believed it was our responsibility to address this issue as quickly as possible. That is why, when we learned about the post on Sunday morning, we immediately launched an investigation into the situation. Members of our administrative team from South, in consultation and cooperation with the Darien Police Department, spoke directly to the student who made the comment, as well as that student's parents/guardians. We also contacted the student who made the original post and brought this issue to our attention to not only thank her for making us aware of what happened, but also make sure she has the support she needs to process what occurred.

We are deeply troubled by this incident, particularly at a time when the issue of race is at the forefront of the conversation in our country. We are also incredibly disappointed that a member of the D86 community would make such a comment in light of the important work our students and staff have done and will continue to do to promote equity and inclusion across our district. This work includes the Beyond Diversity training our staff has engaged in, the efforts undertaken by the district's LEADS racial equity leadership team, the formation of the D86 Culture and Equity Leadership Team in conjunction with our strategic plan, and the events and activities that student groups such as The Culture at Hinsdale South have organized to help project positive images of people of color.

While we have taken some positive steps toward addressing the issues of racial bias and systemic racism, this incredibly discouraging and disheartening incident highlights how much more we have left to do. It serves as a valuable reminder about the power of words and the impact they have on others. It also underscores how important it is that we continue working together to embrace our differences and celebrate our diversity.

Please be assured that this work will continue this summer. It shall not be limited to what happens inside our buildings, or restricted by the confines of a school calendar. It shall remain a driving force for our strategic plan. It will continue to be taken seriously, and will receive the time, effort, energy and resources it demands and deserves. More importantly, it will be guided by the voices of our students, staff and families.

We are strong, steadfast and unwavering in our commitment to ensuring that every single member of our community is treated with compassion and respect, is held to the same high standards and expectations, and is given the opportunity to realize their ideal future. It is our sincere hope that you will join us in these efforts, and help create an environment in our schools, district and society that is safe and welcoming for all. We also want to thank everyone who contacted us regarding this matter. They have made it clear that this incident does not reflect or represent who we are as a school, district or community. We have and will continue to stand together to protect the rights and dignity of one another.

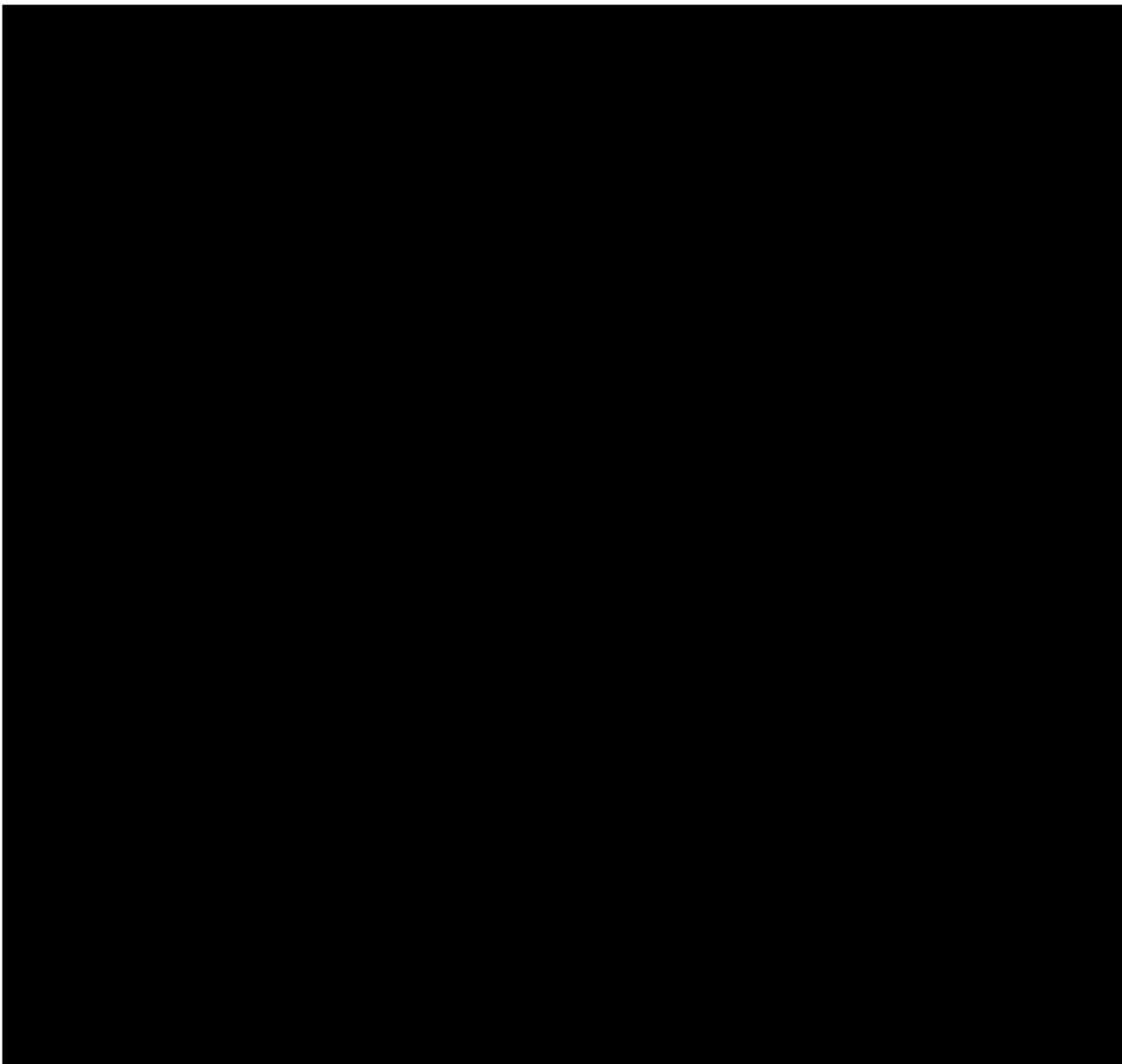



This weekend, a student from Hinsdale South posted an offensive, hateful and racially motivated comment on social media in response to the tragedy involving George Floyd and the overall treatment of people of color. Although it did not happen on school grounds or during the school year, we believed it was our responsibility to address this issue as quickly as possible. That is why, when we learned about the post on Sunday morning, we immediately launched an investigation into the situation. Members of our administrative team from South, in consultation and cooperation with the Darien Police Department, spoke directly to the student who made the comment, as well as that student's parents/guardians. We also contacted the student who made the original post and brought this issue to our attention to not only thank her for making us aware of what happened, but also make sure she has the support she needs to process what occurred.
